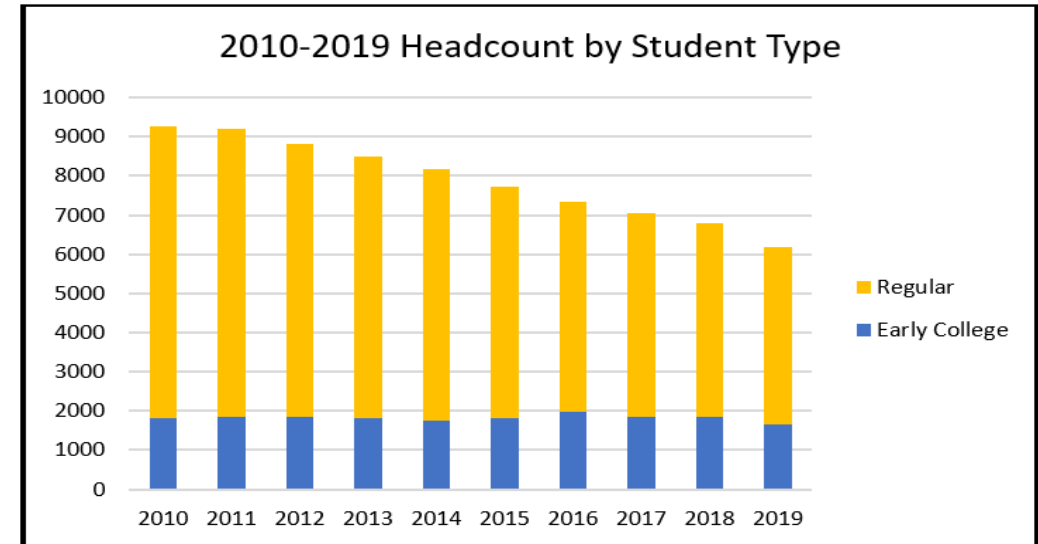

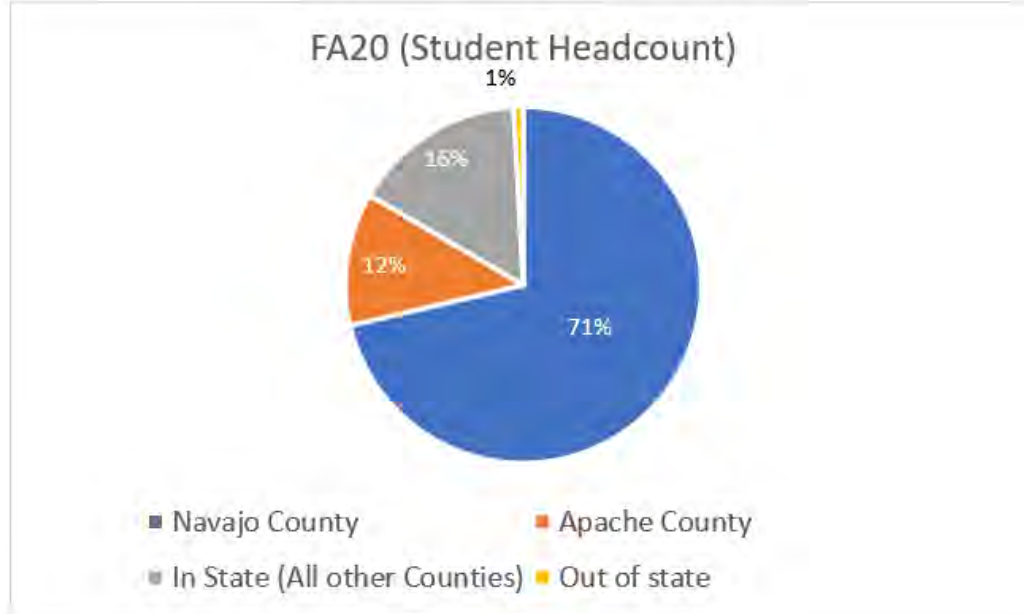
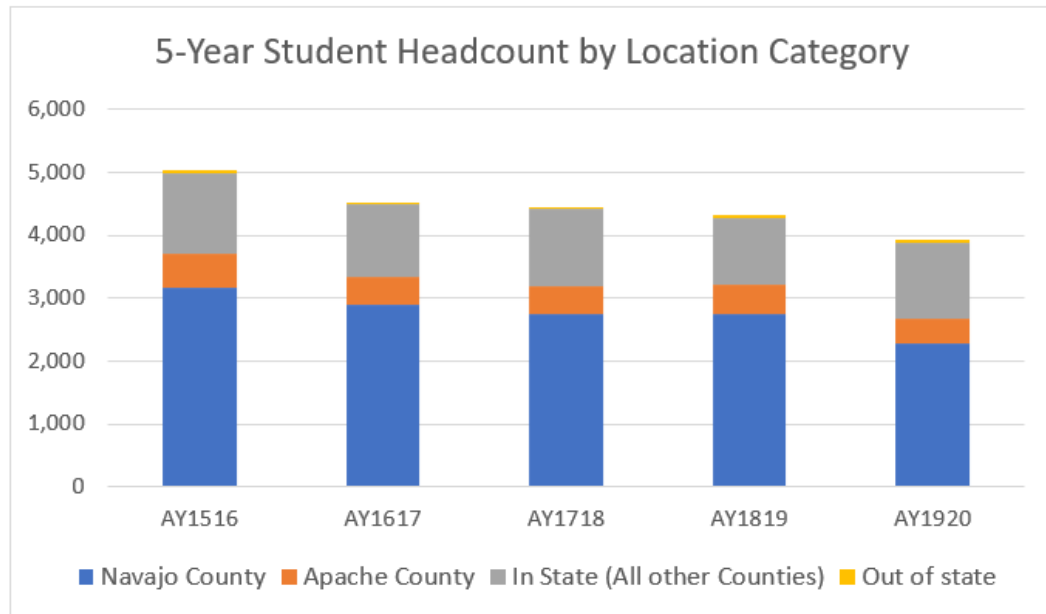


Decline in Regular Students = -39%  
Decline in Early College Students = -8%



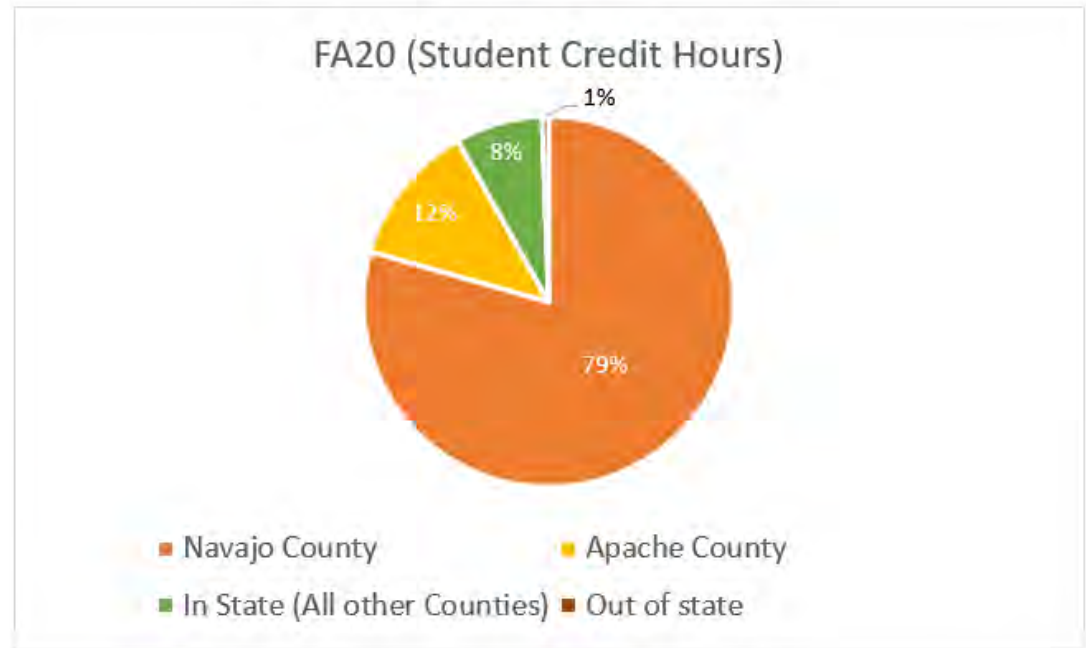
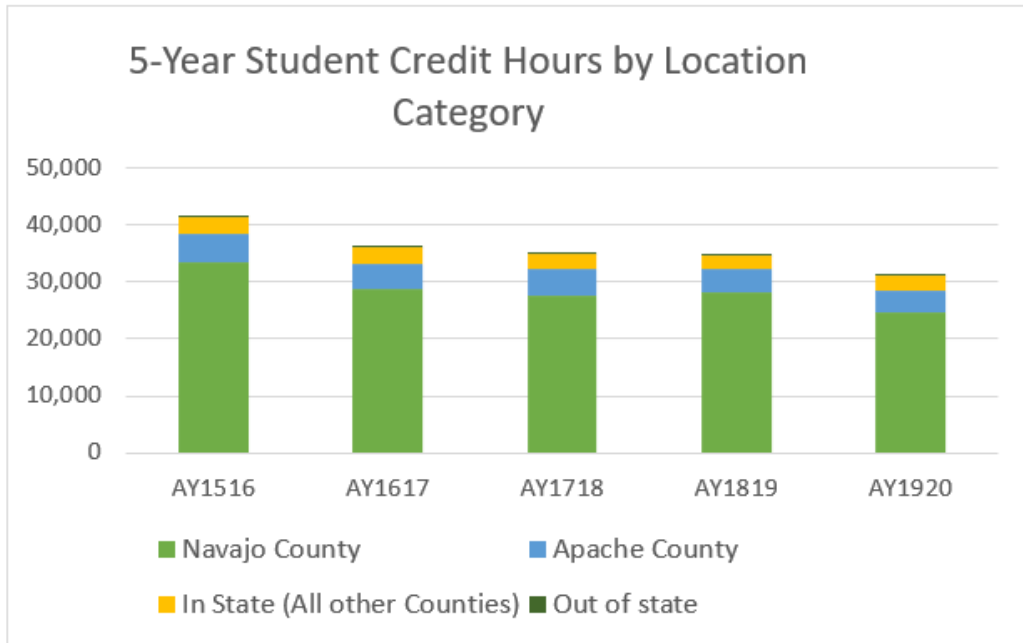

# Developing Estimates based on Scenarios

- The approved in-state and out-of-state tuition rates for 2020-21 are used to apply to the average student credit hours (SCH) by residential location category.
- The residential location categories include:
  - Navajo county
  - Apache county
  - In-state (all other counties)
  - Out-of-State
- For each residential location category, the average student credit hours are calculated by dividing the sum of the student credit hours from AY 2015-16 to AY 2018-2019 by four.
- Three scenarios are built by creating different in-district tuition reduction options, using the in-state tuition rate as the base:
  - 75%
  - 80%
  - 85%

\*Two student estimation options are considered here to present a range:

(1) average 7 SCH per student (2) 80%-20% part-time/full-time split with 6 SCH for part-time and 12 SCH for full-time

Assuming all things are equal.

If a new in-district tuition rate was created, the 75% discount could create a revenue loss of \$673K. To offset this loss, an additional 11,362 student credit hours would be needed. Depending on the different student estimation options, the college would need to recruit an additional 1,623 to 1,704 In-district students to offset the potential revenue loss. To support the option, these additional students would represent an increase of 41% to 43% over the AY1920 headcount (3,928).

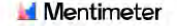

Make multiple options for accessing learning opportunities accessible.

Make enrollment easy

Get to Alex where she is, both literally and figuratively.

Understand Alex's educational goals and match as many resources that are available.

Connect them with a college team: a short list of actual people they can go to who will help them with whatever issue they may be facing

Develop a strong relationship in which Alex's goals, context, learning needs, and interests are known and followed by a caring college person.

What are Alex's goals, barriers; what is already completed

Fix our registration issues

Fully understand Alex's situation and obstacles

Prioritize Alex's needs. She's the reason we are here.

Don't make assumptions about students.

Successful in what?

Proactive outreach for unfinished applications and class difficulty

require that the student meets with an academic advisor

Provide high-quality, interactive instruction that engages Alex in critical thinking.

Identify how Alex learns best.

Bridging the digital divide, providing clear degree/career pathways and scaffolding, and equitable inclusive learning experience (Wei)

appeal to his interest with relevant programs and course offerings

make information about registration and courses and areas of interest easily accessible

We must fix our Jenzabar/MyNPC problem above all else!!!

follow up with the student

First we must identify what success is to her. Once we know where she wants to go, or what target she wants to hit, we can then identify how to best support her.

What is Alex studying?

What are Alex's interests? Help Alex determine what his career goals are (why is he coming to college?). Connect Alex with staff, faculty, and other students to create a sense of community.

Make sure she/he is oriented to the college and connected with an advisor, has the tools he needs (technology) and knows how to use them, can get into Moodle and access courses, and knows who her/his faculty is.

Identify what motivates/drives Alex

Make our enrollment process easier.

Ensure systems at the college work well together so that Alex is able to navigate from advisement to registration to graduation.

Help student determine goals or interest

suggest they complete financial aid

Identify goals, help layout a plan to achieve those goals, support Alex along the way, identify barriers and help to reduce those barriers.

Give him 100% support

Get a student app so students can interact with us and get questions answered faster and easier!

make application process seamless and simple

Ask Alex what is success to Alex

Make multiple learning formats accessible to Alex.



Make sure she/he is oriented to the college and connected with an advisor, has the tools she/he needs (technology) and knows how to use them, can access the LMS and knows who her/his faculty are.

Focus on Alex's needs. She's the reason we are here.

Make sure Alex has the tools (technology) necessary and knows how to use them.

Collaborate with Alex to develop goals and identify a safety net.

Meet Alex where she is, both literally and figuratively. Don't expect her to come to us.

Have him assigned to a faculty mentor who works with Alex's progress toward his pathway goal. The faculty member will check in with Alex at the beginning, and toward the end of the semester.

evaluate transfer transcripts within 2 days

1. Provide clear degree/career pathways and scaffolding; 2. Bridging the digital divide; 3. Providing equitable, inclusive learning experience

Make sure Alex is oriented to the college and connected with an advisor.

Assure that Alex can access his/her courses and connect with faculty.
