#### **Introduction**

Northland Pioneer College (NPC) is a comprehensive multi-campus community college located in northeastern Arizona. Established in 1974, NPC has just celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary and now has 4 campuses, 5 learning centers, and other delivery sites throughout the service area. NPC provides coursework in Apache County through an annually renewed intergovernmental agreement. Close to 60% of NPC's service area population is Native American primarily residing on the lands of the Navajo Nation, Hopi Nation, and White Mountain Apache Nation. Of the 21,158 square mile service area, nearly 40% of the land is set aside as reservation while another large amount of land is in BLM or National land, significantly affecting NPC's ability to tax local property. With few exceptions, NPC is the single provider of higher education in both Navajo and Apache counties (Diné College services portions of the Navajo Nation). Distance, poverty levels, and low educational attainment present challenges that NPC will always work with its communities to resolve.

#### Major Accomplishments in 2023-2024

- Completed the Higher Learning Commission's Year 4 Assurance Review; received approval to offer two
  new bachelor's degree programs (Bachelor of Arts in Early Education and Bachelor of Applied
  Management).
- NPC was awarded an Arizona 3-year grant totaling \$8.98 million to build a new Center in Kayenta with a library and a science lab. The new location will provide better visibility and access to students.
- Anticipated to receive the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Report for the tenth consecutive year.
- Offered new programs in behavioral health, administration of justice studies, and personal training and rehabilitation; used funding from the State's Office of Economic Opportunity to purchase equipment for welding, firefighter, and new commercial driver license programs.
- The College and Career Preparation program raised Measurable Skill Gains from 28% in FY22-23 to 43% in FY23-24, a seven-year high for the program and the first time meeting the state's goal in several years. The number of individuals earning their High School Equivalency also increased 2.5 times from the previous year.
- The Nursing program graduated 37 students with a 100% NCLEX-RN pass rate.
- Implemented a new Integrated Education & Training (NAT-IET) program for College and Career Preparation students to work on their High School Equivalency preparation/developmental education and to complete Nursing's NAT 101 course to prepare for the Licensed Nursing Assistant certification examination. Many students in the IET are Native American and live from Kayenta to Whiteriver in the NPC service area. The NAT-IET program also won the League for Innovation Award.
- Upgraded microwave tower equipment to enhance reliability and expand bandwidth for campus and center connections; upgraded network equipment to support higher internet and network speeds.
- Implemented several new systems in various departments to improve student learning experience or departmental operations (e.g., the Cosmetology department purchased a modern management software to

- increase salon workflows for students and faculty; the Human Resources department purchased SkillSurvey to minimize supervisors making phone calls to check references and limit legal exposure).
- Using Title III funds, NPC created a Virtual Student center for students to navigate the NPC website more efficiently and a Virtual Online Student Center by installing computer kiosks at all campuses and centers. Using these kiosks, students can communicate in a virtual meeting with various offices and departments across NPC. NPC also hosted student success/financial wellness workshops, open house events, and community focus groups at each tribal center to promote Native American Student Success and partnership opportunities.
- Began remodeling the Goldwater Building at the White Mountain Campus to create a welcome center for students and visitors.
- Moved the Springerville/Eager center location from a K-12 facility to a new stand-alone location with a science lab. The new location provides better visibility and access to students.

#### Major Issues & Resolutions in 2023-2024

- Implemented monthly onboarding for new hires to address concerns about onboarding new employees.
- As a result of hiring a project manager and two operational leads, the Anthology ERP project has made progress in its implementation. NPC is more than 1 year into its roughly 3-year implementation and continues to partner with Cochise Community College in this implementation.
- To meet the redesigned Arizona General Education Curriculum (AGEC), NPC has cross-college collaboration on reviewing AGEC courses for new designations, General Education courses, and progress on the AGEC Certificate (as well as updated degree programs).
- To address student enrollment and completion concerns, NPC's Early College Department collaborated with internal and external stakeholders to enhance partnerships, especially with high school districts. The Early College FTSE increased by 19% in AY2324, representing the largest enrollment growth since the pandemic. Two new high schools, Window Rock High School and Monument Valley High School, are added for dual and concurrent enrollment.

### **Upcoming Issues for 2024-2025**

- Hiring a new President who will support NPC's mission and vision and effectively work with our board and all employees with the existing planning structure and process towards the 2025-30 Strategic Directions.
- Product gaps in Human Resources and Non-Credit program offerings have been identified during the Anthology ERP implementation, resulting in the need to identify additional software tools to ensure various data are integrated seamlessly.
- Continued student enrollment and completion concerns, with enrollments tied to spending limitations associated with the archaic Expenditure Limit formula.
- Continuing to strengthen communication practices across the college to promote effective shared governance, relationships, and collaboration.
- Change management concerns with implementing many strategic initiatives/priority actions.
